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## THE KEY NOTE ADDRESS

I love to see, when leaves depart,
The clear anatomy arrive,
Winter, the paragon of art,
That kills all forms of life and feeling
Save what is pure and will survive.

Ignatius Royston Dunnachia Campbell (1901 1957) writes in his poem titled Autumn. In isolation this verse has a tendency of suggesting that winter is the harshest but the most revealing of seasons. Winter kills the leaves and leave the trunk and branches bare. The trunk and branches survive because they are not seasonal phenomena. They are the essence of a tree. Seasons must come and seasons must go, but no one season makes a tree while one season makes the leaves and the other season kills them. Winter is often depicted as a bad season, but it is not. If it is, it is a bad season that is necessary.

We have travelled rocky roads in recent times as a Municipality. So many legal demands were thrown at us at the same time as if they were orchestrated from the same centre and for the same outcome. We have had our winter time and have learnt lessons we would otherwise have not learnt in a life time. Most of the matters are still sub judice.

Another dark cloud has been the fatal accidents that involved our citizens. Six locals from Mongalo and Dithabaneng died in a horrific car accident over the December festive season.

May their souls rest in peace. Fatal accidents have become a common site on our roads in the country as a whole. It is important that all road users adopt extra cautious approach and vigilance when they drive or walk on or along the roads. We value every human life.

On the 13th December we visited and spent a day with patients at the Helene Franz Hospital, Senwabarwana. If what they said to us be believed, we may need to make these kind of visits one of our routines or at least have them as very important annual events. They said they felt better

and important thanks to the visit. These days a lot of people lose hope easily when a person is hospitalized. Their visits to their own patient are so infrequent they affect the patient. People who are ill and hospitalized are not dead, are not about to die, but are just going through a winter in their lives. Our visits are like rain, they nourish them and bring back all forms of life and feeling in them. I can imagine how it feels to be crowded during your time of need. I shudder to imagine how the opposite feels.

On a positive note, we are happy to report that we handed over five pre schools to the communities of Letswatla; Mongalo; Schoengezicht; Avon and Kgwale. We have laid a solid foundation for the many future leaders who will eventually be produced through the educational institutions of these communities. We also took care of the educational roofing needs of Malete Tumisho Praise and Rabumbulu Through the Mayor's Bursary Fund these Hermina. students will now realize their dreams of becoming civil engineers. The Mayor's Bursary Fund is still in its infancy, but has already produced a Manager Capital Projects; an IT Assistant; and an Electrical Technician. We remain concerned with the level of interest shown in this Bursary Fund. This year we received close on fourty applications, which is a small number unless all other maths and science matriculants from this area have had bursary offers from other sources. Application forms will be out again in the second semester of 2008 for the 2009 academic year. Council will soon decide on priority study fields for 2009. Please keep in touch with your Ward Councilor; Ward Committee; Community Development Worker and the Blouberg News for the latest information on this crucial matter.

It is important that we continue to commend members of our communities who believe in our public participation structures and processes and use them effectively. We have never failed to come to communities to solicit their inputs on the annual plans and reports; to explain why there is lack of progress on certain programmes and projects; and to take their regular mandates and give regular feedback. Issues are best resolved in formal and constructive engagements.

## **ADMINISTRATIVE OVERVIEW**

ost probably every citizen of this country is aware or has heard of the electricity shortage that we are faced with. The problem can escalate into a crisis unless we all join hands and participate in all efforts meant to save electricity. Elsewhere in this edition there are basic tips that every patriot should practice to save electricity.

Already the Department of Minerals and Energy has developed draft regulations to prohibit certain practices in the electricity supply and provide for compulsory norms and standards for electricity reticulation services. Closing date for comments on the draft regulations was 25 February 2008. In addition, the Limpopo Provincial Government has developed the draft Provincial Energy Efficiency Plan.

Municipalities are expected to come to the party by developing their own plans. It should be mentioned that the draft regulations referred to above seek to enable municipalities to pass by laws prohibiting any activity in the interest of energy efficiency or enforcing the regulations. We therefore invite all our customers and stakeholders to support the campaigns for electricity saving.

Good news is that we are on track regarding governance programmes and processes. We have gone full throttle in policy development and establishment of structures to anchor our good governance initiatives. The following policies were adopted by the Council during the period in issue: Fraud and Corruption Policy; Records Management Policy; Promotion of Access to Information Policy; Publicity Policy; Sexual Harassment Policy; Mayoral Discretionary Fund Policy; and Public Participation Policy.

Further policies would be tabled and probably approved by the Council of 28 March 2008. These include: Employment Equity Plan for 2008 2012; Overtime Policy; Telephone Usage Policy and E Mail Records Policy. These policies should do good our accountability; transparency; and internal control values and practices.

We drafted and tabled the IDP/Budget 2008/09 and the Annual Report 2006/07 as required by legislation. We did ward based public participation on the draft IDP/Budget from the 5th to the 23rd February 2008. Public hearings on the annual report were scheduled for the 31th March and 1st April 2008. It should be noted that the annual report had to be dealt with without the financial statements.

We had our auditors withdrawn by the Office of the Auditor General for reasons beyond us and, at the time of going to press, a new audit firm had just commenced with the audit. The Audit Committee which the municipality established in 2007 is working round the clock in collaboration with the Internal Audit unit to assist the Municipality to improve on its accounting practices and to ensure that previously identified queries get the necessary attention.

For the first time in the history of the Municipality we will have an opinion of the Audit Committee on the annual report. This shows that the institution is going somewhere on issues of accounting and accurate handling of public finances.

It is important that we mention our disappointment with customers who fail to pay for the services they enjoy from us. We had no option but to adjust our budget negatively because of this turn of events. This resulted in some of the programmes being jettisoned. For example our annual congratulatory function where the floating trophy could have for the third time been given to Marumofase secondary school which has consistently produced the best results.

The municipality will however ensure the official handing over of the trophy is done to the deserving institution. Bravo to all the Educators, learners and Parents who positively ensure that the flag of the Municipality is raised and held high when it comes to the best practices in schools.

In an attempt to boost schools that performed poorly a resolution has been taken that our Executive Committee members, Speaker and Chief whip should adopt some such schools to give them support through any means possible be it morally and or materially. The District Executive Mayor, Clr. Motalane Monakedi has already adopted Nakedi Secondary School in Devrede.

The 2006/7 electrification projects could not be implemented on time. We are looking at implementing them during the last quarter of the year. Beneficiaries have already been made aware of the difficulties we experienced in the first quarter of the year. Kodumela.

## The Speaker Speaks

"The entirety of our system of governance is therefore making the commitment that in the period ahead of us, it will do its best to live up to the imperative Business Unusual! We speak of Business Unusual not referring to any changes in our established policies but with regard to the speedy, efficient and effective implementation of these policies and programmes, so that the lives of our people should change for the better, sooner rather than later ... More than at any other time, the situation that confronts our nation and country, and the tasks we have set ourselves, demand that we inspire and organise all our people to act together as one, to do all the things that have to be done, understanding that in a very real sense, all of us, together, hold our own future in our hands."

We quote from the 2008 State of the Nation Address by President Thabo Mbeki. In simple terms the President says we need each other and a new attitude if we are to achieve our national goal - a better life for all earlier than we would ordinarily get there.

The annual programmes that were adopted by our Ward Committees Conference on the 19th August 2007 are meant to bring a better life for all. So are the reasons for the establishment of our Mayor/Magoshi Forum and the plethora of forums herein mentioned. It is only in a democratic society, that these structures and programmes are aimed at achieving, that there is a possibility of a better life for all. Therefore, we expect the Ward Committees and other forums whose purpose is to enhance participatory democracy to review their strategies and tactics in line with our new approach Business Unussual. As we will be returning to our Ward Committees Forum in August 2008 we hope all ward committees would have a good story to tell.

In November 2007 the Council of Blouberg Municipality approved the Public Participation Policy. On the 28th of May 2008 the same Council will approve Ward Committees Support Policy together with a budget to realise the objects of the two complementary and progressive policies. It cannot be less than what we are currently operating on, R500,000 Ward Committees Support and R70,000 Public Participation budgets. We have noted the ward committees' submission for the review of the current uniform out of pocket expense of R50 per sitting. This and other matters related to ward committees support should be factored into the Ward Committees Support Policy that will be introduced to the ward committees meetings of 02 - 08 May 2008.

We are happy to announce that we are continuing to chalk up one achievement after the other in matters of good governance and public participation. One of the principles of good governance is engaging stakeholders and making accountability real. Real accountability is concerned not only with reporting on or discussing actions already taken, but also with engaging with stakeholders to understand and respond to their views as the organisation plans and carries out its activities. Our forums on water; energy; housing; disaster management; transport; waste management; local economic development, etc, have continued to meet and execute their tasks as planned. Not only were these structures established for accountability purposes, but to harmonise our working relationships to achieve better outcomes. We continued to hold our Council and Executive Committee meetings in public for purposes of transparency

and accountability as these meetings were accompanied by the imbizo sessions where members of the public were able to raise issues with a full compliment of their councillors.

Though some of our departments did not provide comprehensive responses to all the issues raised at the January 2008 ward committees sittings we are heartened by the fact that our Management has began to seriously prioritise responding to ward committees submissions. We are assured that the responses to the March 2008 sittings would be even better in terms of substance and completeness.

To crown it all the Department of Provincial and Local Government (dplg) has produced a DVD on the Blouberg public participation model. Let it be told that we are not about to rest on our laurels. We said in the last edition "We at Blouberg are addicted to setting trends and perfecting our ways of doing things." Accordingly we are in the process of revising our Communications Strategy for 2008/2009 so that we continue to perfect our ways of doing things.

## SAVE ELECTRICITY

South Africa has a power shortage the demand for electricity exceeds supply. There is a need, therefore, for all of us to help save electricity lest the whole power supply system crumbles. Should this happen we will all experience untold economic crisis, job losses, health hazards; and many other socio economic difficulties.

Unless we all contribute to power saving by doing all or most of the suggestions herein below, ESKOM may have to return to and turn on the heat on load shedding as miserably experienced during January 2008. it is expected that this power shortage will be with us for the next 5-10 years.

#### 1. TURN OFF YOUR GEYSERS FROM 6AM TO 9PM

Your geyser uses up to 50% of the electricity in your home. Switch it off during these high demand times and you'll hardly notice the difference in water temperature. You could also set your pool pump to only work at night and you would reduce your demand even more.

#### 2. INSTALL A GEYSER BLANKET OR SOLAR WATER HEATING

ESKOM is currently finalising plans to subsidise the installation of water heating panels.

#### 3. SWITCH OFF UNNECESSARY LIGHTS

We hardly need lights all lights on during the day and at night. Also use Compact Flourescent Lamps (CFL's).

### 4. TURN UP YOUR AIR CONDITIONER BY 2% AND WEAR LIGHT CLOTHING AT WORK

This was a hugely successful initiative in Japan and they managed to drop their power demand by a massive 10%. If you do the opposite in winter with heating, the same savings apply.

#### 5. SWITCH OFF ALL APPLIANCES AT THE PLUG

An appliance on stand-by is actually still drawing power and is similar to a 'dripping tap'. This includes your TV, VCR's and personal computer.

### 6. KEEP THE FRIDGE DOOR CLOSED

Every second you have the fridge door open the fridge loses temperature and power is used to get it back.

#### 7. Use the stove sparingly

Rather use the microwave as the stove and oven consume huge amounts of electricity.

### 8. DO NOT TUMBLE DRY

Tumble dryers use massive amounts of electricity. Try hanging up your washing on the line instead.

#### **9.** HAVE YOUR SAY

## **BLOUBERG PROMOTES THE RIGHT TO INFORMATION**

The Promotion of Access to Information Act, 2 of 2000, is aimed at fostering a culture of transparency and accountability in the public and private bodies to actively promote a society in which people of South Africa have effective access to information to enable them to fully exercise and protect all of their rights.

#### What is Section 14 Manual?

A Section 14 Manual is an official document which would assist a person to obtain real access to information held by the Municipality and stipulates minimum requirements that one has to comply with. The Manual also indicates the type of record the Municipality has in its possession.

#### What information does the Municipality possess?

The Municipality is in possession of two categories of information:

- The category of records automatically available without the a person having to request access in terms of the Act;
- The category of records available to a person having to request access in terms of the Act

#### Which information is automatically available?

The information automatically available without a person having to apply for access include:

- IDPs and Budgets;
- Bv laws:
- Financial Statements:
- Annual reports;
- Tenders:
- Speeches; etc

This is information you ordinarily find on the Municipality's website.

## Which information is not automatically available to a person

This is information/records that may not necessary be refused but may only be made available upon request and include:

- Salaries and remuneration packages;
- Medical records of employees
- · Bank statements and records of investments;
- Customers' application, registration and consumption details;
- Copies of tenders advertised and awarded
- Database of suppliers registration for tendering purposes; etc

#### How should a person make a request?

- For information that is automatically available, copies of the requested documents are available pending payment for reproduction of the document, and
- For information that is not automatically available, a request form/application has to be completed by the requester. The request form should be accompanied by R35 request fee. The request should be forwarded to the Information Officer at:

### **BLOUBERG FIGHTS FRAUD AND CORRUPTION**

Blouberg Municipality now has a policy on fraud and corruption. The policy was passed by the Council meeting of 30 November 2007 and seeks to facilitate the development of controls which will assist in the prevention and detection of fraud and corruption, as well as provide guidelines as to how to respond should instances of fraud and corruption be identified. The policy applies to all employees, stakeholder, contractors, vendors, suppliers and any other party doing business with the Municipality.

The following are some of the actions identified in the policy as manifestations or examples of corruption and fraud:

- Unauthorised private use of municipal assets, including vehicles:
- Falsifying travel and subsistence claims;
- Conspiring unfairly with others to obtain a tender;
- Disclosing proprietary information relating to a tender to outside parties;
- Accepting inappropriate gifts from suppliers;
- Employing family members or close friends;
- Operating a private business in working hours;

- Stealing equipment or supplies from work;
- Accepting bribes or favour to process requests;
- Accepting bribes or favours for turning a blind eye to a service provider who does not provide an appropriate services;
- Submitting or processing false invoices from contractors or other service providers;
- Misappropriating fees received from customers, and avoiding detection by not issuing receipts to those customers.

The policy makes it the responsibility of all the employees of the Municipality to report all incidents of fraud and corruption, or any other dishonest activities of a similar nature to their managers. Therefore he who does not report a known corrupt or fraudulent activity is equally guilty of the crime. If every employee of the Municipality were to be adequately vigilant and determined to detect and report corruption and fraud we would all have our work of fighting this crime cut short.

Public participation becomes better every day thanks to continuous revision of policies

Blouberg Municipality is renowned for walking the talk when it comes to the promotion of participatory governance. Section (16) of the Local Government: Municipal Systems Act, 32 of 2000, requires of a municipality to encourage and create conditions for the local community to participate in the affairs of the municipality. For this purpose a municipality may use its resources and annually allocate funds in its budget for the purpose of encouraging and enabling participatory governance.

Accordingly Blouberg Municipality is in the process of developing a policy to support and encourage members of the community to participate actively in the ward committees. The policy, called the Ward Committees Support Policy, is likely to be approved by the Council sitting of 30 May 2008 in time for it to become operational in the new financial year (2008/2009). Comments and inputs of all stakeholders are invited.

Among the criteria that will be used to determine the excellence or otherwise of the ward committees are the following

- 1. Implementation of Ward Plans
- The efforts and extent to which the ward committees implement their own annual plans
- 2. Relationship with Key stakeholders
- How ward committees relate with the key stakeholders such as traditional authorities and community development workers
- Initiatives undertaken to harmonise stakeholder relations in the ward
- 3. Communication
- Being able to meet as a ward committee; being able to successfully mobilize members of the community to public meetings;
- Communication of issues raised at ward meetings to

- Council or Administration and feedback thereof
- The extent to which members of the community receive services that are available and that they are entitled to
- 4. Compliance with Constitution
- The extent to which the Ward Committee and individual members comply with the Ward Committees Constitution
- 5. Innovation
- Innovations the Ward Committee has introduced to improve service delivery and participatory governance.

This is just a synopsis of the draft policy. Full text can be obtained from the municipal offices during working hours. The final drafts will serve at the ward committee meetings of 02 08 May 2008 and the Mayor/Magoshi Forum meeting of 12 May 2008.

## DISASTER AWARENESS CAMPAIGN

Floods, fire and Storm are natural disasters that can strike at anytime more so that it is beyond human control. In instances of disaster it is important for people to know help is at hand. This has prompted the Blouberg Municipality in conjunction with Capricorn District Municipality to organize a disaster awareness campaign.

The campaign was held at Grootpan and Ramaswikana on 27 February 2008. The campaign was an eye-opener to the villagers to become alert of the danger of fire, belhaziour and floods. The campaign targeted people in deep rural areas staying far from disaster management service. It was important also for the people to know that help is always available. To teach more on disaster was Mr. Solly Molele from the department of Environment Health at Helen Franz hospital and Mr. Serope from Capricorn District Municipality under the Fire and Rescue unit stationed at Blouberg.

Ms Winnie Thaba of CDM Disaster Management said people will be given first aid training to help and rescue community in the event of fire and floods.

She further indicated that the proposals are underway to have call points installed for the headmen and plans to upgrade network around Blouberg area were still in the pipeline. Currently victims of disaster are assisted with tents, clothes and food.

Since the campaign started last year areas visited include Byswater, Earlydawn and Mankgodi. Other villages remaining on the list are Maleboho, Avon, Sias, Moisimane, Taaibosch and Towerfontein.

## MUNICIPAL PROPERTY RATES ACT SIMPLIFIED

#### 1. What is municipal property rate?

Municipal property rates are a cent amount in a rand levied on the market value of immovable property.

#### 2. Who is liable for the payment of municipal property rates?

All immovable property owners are liable for the payment of rates. Therefore, all property owners, including commercial, residential, agriculture, government, etc, are included in the definition of property.

#### 3. How are municipal property rates determined?

The financial liabilities for municipal property rates are calculated by multiplying the market value of immovable property by a cent amount in the rand that a municipal council has determined.

#### 4. How is the market value of the property determined?

The market value of the property is the amount the property would have realised if sold on the date of valuation in the open market by a willing seller to a willing buyer. Professional, independent valuers, who in terms of section 39 of the Municipal Property Rates Act, must be persons registered as "a professional valuer or professional associated valuer in terms of the Property Valuers Profession Act, 47 of 2000" know how to value properties which have not yet been sold in terms of the principle of "willing seller to a willing buyer."

## 5. Does the Municipal Property Rates Act contain checks and balances to protect property owners?

Yes. The Minister for the Provincial and Local Government, with the concurrence of the Minister of Finance, can limit the cent amount in the rand that municipalities impose, if such proof can be provided that such a cent amount in the rand on specific category of properties is materially and unreasonably prejudicing national economic policies, economic activities across municipal boundaries or the national mobility of goods, services, capital or labour. Any sector of the economy, after consulting the relevant municipality or municipalities and organised local government, may, through its organised structures, request the Minister for Provincial and Local Government to evaluate evidence to the effect that a particular cent amount in the rand on any specific category of properties, or a rate on any specific category of properties above a specific cent amount in the rand, is materially and unreasonably prejudicing any of the matters mentioned above.

#### 6. What is property rates revenue used for?

Municipalities need a reliable source of revenue to provide basic services and perform their functions. Property rates are the most important source of general revenue for municipalities. Revenue from property rates is used to fund services that benefit the community as a whole as opposed to individual households. Property rates revenue is also used to fund municipal administration and costs of governance. Municipal property rates are set, collected and used locally.

## 7. Where can one get more information on the Municipal Property Rates Act?

The Act is available on **www.dplg.gov.za**. Hard copies are available at the Blouberg Municipality offices at reasonable duplication charges.

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
